### A Message from our Pastor

On June 18, the General Assembly of the PC(USA) will convene in Portland, Oregon to discuss and vote on business items from Presbyteries and Synods all over the country. Commissioners and guests will worship and pray together. Commissioners will meet in their assigned committees and convene as the assembly to vote on the final recommendations. They will laugh, discuss, argue, compromise, and vote their conscience – as they feel led by the Spirit to vote. This year the assembly will be voting on a new stated clerk as well as moderators who will serve the denomination for two years.

There are many overtures that come to the General Assembly offices and then are assigned to committees to discuss and amend and then present in final form to the body. Among those drawing attention and discussion focus on how the General Assembly determines its social witness policy. Currently, this is done through the Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy. According to their web page on the PCUSA website, "the Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy (ACSWP) serves the prophetic calling of the whole Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) by providing the General Assembly with careful studies of pressing moral challenges, media for discussion and discernment of Christian responsibilities, and policy recommendations for faithful action. The Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy is responsible for the process of developing and recommending social witness policy to the General Assembly. The term "social witness policy" refers to the positions adopted by the General Assembly to express its stance on and guide response to issues in the public order, including their relation to the church's own life and mission. These positions may take the form of policy statements, resolutions, study papers, or social involvement reports."

This advisory committee works to help congregations, presbyteries and synods approach difficult moral and social issues we all face. There are some who would like to change this process and have made an overture to the General Assembly to consider.

In addition to the ACSWP overtures, there are many others including changing the book of order to all for virtual attendance when the technology is available, addressing climate change, redrawing synod boundaries, and a number of other overtures. While there are many issues raised at the GA you may think strange, contentious or even petty, we must remember all of these overtures began with a Session and a Presbytery. They reflect what is on the minds of Presbyterians all over the country, and so they will be prayerfully and thoughtfully considered.

Please remember to keep the commissioners and other participants in your prayers. It is a great responsibility they have undertaken, and it is a very difficult job. Pray for God's guidance and for the Holy Spirit to move within the assembly as they discern where God is calling our church.
