Presbyterians Cook

If January is as cold as December, soups and stews should be on everyone's menu. There is nothing more comforting on a cold winter day than soup or stew. Christine Rueff contributed this recipe and it is great. She found this in the Farm Journal Magazine – late 1970's. It is a six-generation recipe.

Wisconsin Lumberjack Stew (or soup)

2# boneless pork cut in 1 inch cubes 1 tsp salt 1 tsp sugar ¹/₂ tsp paprika $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp pepper 2 T cooking oil 1 cup sliced onion 1 clove minced garlic 1 T lemon iuice 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce 2 bay leaves 2 chicken bouillon cubes 3 cups water 6 medium carrots, pared and cut into 1" chunks 2 – 9 oz. packages frozen cut green beans 3 T corn starch 1/2 cup water

Season pork with salt, sugar, paprika and pepper. Brown pork in hot oil in 4 qt. Dutch oven. Add sliced onion and garlic; sauté 5 minutes. Add next 5 ingredients. Cover and simmer for one hour.

Add carrots, simmer covered 40 minutes. Add green beans, simmer covered 10 minutes.

Blend cornstarch and ½ c. water together. Stir into simmering stew and cook 2 minutes.

Serves 8

Christine's Notes:

This takes considerably more bullion and water. I add until it appears properly balanced.

I do not add the cornstarch and water to thicken at the end. We prefer a thinner broth for this soup.
