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Out of My Mind ~ for December 2013 ponderings from Pastor John

You may have noticed the long plastic sheet along the east wall of the fellowship hall. That is our developing TimeLine. As I wrote last month, we will be calling a Town Hall meeting to "Harvest our History" with an eye toward what is God leading us to take forward into our future ... and what might we leave behind ... ???

Part of that process will be each of you putting yourself and your family, the significant events in your life that tie to FPCR, on the TimeLine. In the past, folks have put a summary on a small posit and placed it at approximately the right year on the time line.

Also at the Town Hall meeting we will review a brief history of FPCR and ask ourselves the above question.

I'm hoping to call the Town Hall meeting sometime in December, and if that does not work out, then in January. The time frame and process will be much like our last Town Hall meeting.

I'll close this month's article by sharing an important lesson I learned [I'm tempted to say 'distilled' since that is a quintessential Kentucky word] while serving Elizabethtown FPC.

Do you know where the phrase *"got your goat"* came from?

The phrase has to do with racing horses. These carefully bred, intense animals are high-energy, high-strung and reactive. Years ago, trainers found that by keeping another animal in the stall, the horse would bond to that animal and be more peaceful and less reactive. They found that the best animals for stall-mates were goats.

So, all being fair in love and horse racing, certain unprincipled, intent-to-win-at-allcosts, trainers would steal the goat from their competitor, just prior to an important race. The bereft horse would be too distraught to run effectively.

When asked how come "Shining Glory" wouldn't run, the trainer replied, "Oh,

someone got his goat!" And, its usage grew from this.

So, when someone *"gets your goat"* they take something away from you that helps you stay calm and well-focused on important events in your life!

In light of our two passages above, let me suggest to you ...

A Measure of your Maturity is the size of what gets your goat!

How big a provocation does it take to have you move your mind off: "true, noble,

right, pure, lovely, admirable, excellent and praiseworthy "... things ... ?

What gets your mind going on things that are: judgmental, harsh, untrue, distasteful, fearful, anxious and unloving ... ?

Often, for me, something that feels like a slight to my person can bump me right off my gratitude for God's Love, and into some sort of seething soul-mess, that is angry, upset, or afraid. I imagine that some of you, too, get knocked out of God's Grace and into something that is not graceful or kind.

How big an experience does it take to produce this fall from Grace \dots for you \dots ? \dots or, for us as a community of faith?

So, what gets your goat?

On November 10th the following letter was sent to Gail Andrews, daughter of Shirley Andrew, and to Wilma Creighton, wife of Harlan Creighton. (Memorial Bricks for Shirley and Harlan were among those placed and dedicated in the Memorial Garden this fall.)

As planned, a week ago after worship the recently placed Memorial bricks were dedicated with a prayer by Rev. Oerter.

In addition to a picture of (Shirley's or Harlan's) brick, I've enclosed pictures of Rev. Oerter and others at the dedication, the bagpiper who played "Amazing Grace" at the dedication, and three views of the central area of the Garden where the Memorial bricks are placed around an evergreen magnolia tree (purchased by Janet Brown).

You'll notice that there is not yet sand between the bricks. Bud Pumfrey will soon put some there. When all the bricks in a square are Memorial bricks he will put polymeric (permanent) sand between the bricks. One square is already completed in this way.
