

I am fascinated by the various permutations of time travel.

I used to read a lot of Science Fiction and enjoy how authors play out their premises around time-travel and the kinds of actions one can and cannot take, in the 'worlds' they create.

Do you know that the Gospel makes a difference in how people understand time, and how we Christ-ones live in time?

Most cultures, where the Gospel of Jesus Christ has not taken hold, have a circular understanding of time. That is, life and events repeat themselves. SO, it really doesn't matter much what one does. [Greek, Roman, Hindu, animist cultures ...]

However, in every culture where the Gospel of Jesus Christ has taken root, time becomes linear! That is: what happens in time is moving to a goal and fulfillment: God's purposes! Hence what we do, if we are part of that, makes a difference.

One of the ways that I organize my thinking about people has to do with time travel: I believe there are two kinds of people:

One kind, and I believe that this group is most of us ... one type of person <u>comes</u> from the past.

The other, a much smaller group of people, come from the future!

By this, I mean that most human beings "live in" the past, and are most strongly affected, in their decisions and investments, by past events. This kind of person often has difficulty with change, and especially in doing something new. As I said, this group seems to be most of humanity.

The second, smaller, group "comes from the future." By this I mean that it is as though there were something in the future that 'reaches back' and grabs these people, dragging them into the future! They "live in" the future, and what they 'see' and experience there is so powerful that they organize what they do, and how they think and feel, by what they know is in the future.

Perhaps you can understand what I mean by "they come from the future ... "

Of course, the folks from the future are very comfortable with change; in fact, they seem driven by it! Most of our significant innovations are accomplished by such people: for instance, Martin Luther, "lived in" a future where everyone read the Scriptures in their

own languages, sang hymns to their God in the tunes of their hearts, and everyone used their gifts to the glory of God! So, he and other like-minded futurists changed the, then, *status quo* toward a better future.

[... notice the brackets ... I hesitate even to write the following ... another man who "came from the future," in my opinion, is Steve Jobs, the founder and visionary of Apple Computer. The end of this month, January 24th to be exact, is the 30th anniversary of the launch of the Mac personal computer. Jobs "lived in" a future where there was a high-quality, easily used computer that was the center of the family life, for individuals and their community, a community that stretched across the world. Kinda spooky, huh? I'm sure this bit of current-culture history fascinates you!!]

Back to serious thoughts ...

Jesus, of course, came from the future ~ God's future ~ far down the millennia from His Bethlehem days. Far from where we still live in God's 'past' ... !!!

So, as we settle into 2014, doing small and larger things to build our futures, I invite you join those who [even just a little bit] "come from the future" and focus on building God's new things here in Rolla, Missouri.

Let us pray for God to give us a glimpse of the glory and grandeur of what God has in store, and let *that* pull us forward into God's possibilities for 2014!
