Several friends and I were discussing that it was fresh produce season. Produce from our gardens and the Farmer's Market is plentiful. I mentioned that I would like to make a tomato tart. Several asked what it was and after I told them the ingredients they asked for the recipe. So here it is:

Basil Tomato Tart

1 pie crust

½ cup flour

Salt

Black Pepper

1 large or 2 medium ripe tomatoes,
sliced ¼" thick

3 green onions with tops, chopped

1/3 cup fresh basil, coarsely chopped

2 cups grated Swiss cheese

½ cup mayonnaise

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Fit crust into 9 inch pie pan. Pour flour, salt and pepper (to taste) into plastic bag. Place tomato slices in bag and shake well to coat. Layer tomatoes on bottom of pie crust, shaking off excess flour, but making sure each slice is completely coated. Top with green onions and basis. Stir together mayonnaise and Swiss cheese, spread on top. Bake until cheese is bubbly and golden brown, about 35 – 40 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes.
